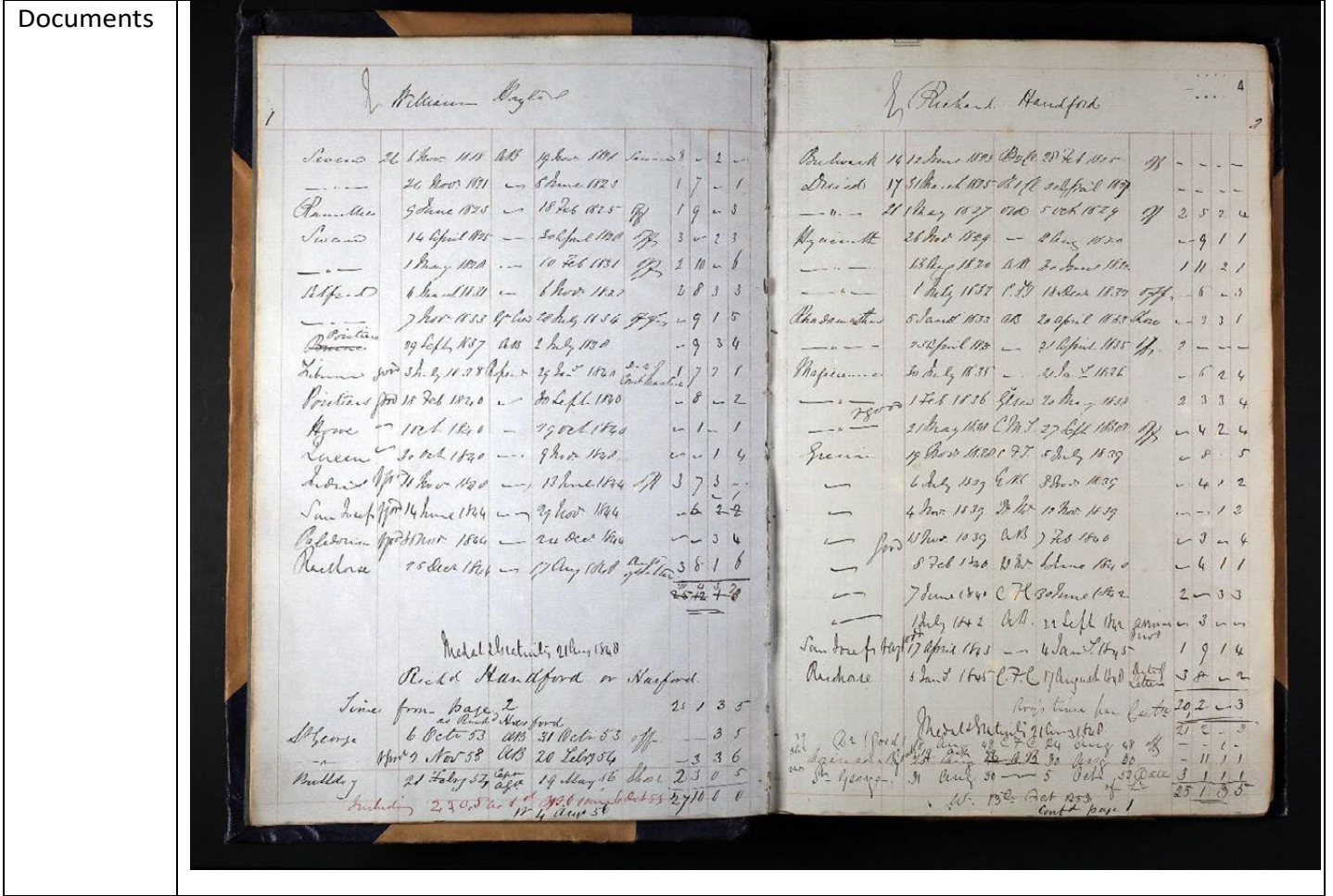


Biographical notes	Richard Handford was born in 1809 and enlisted in the Royal Navy in 1825 as a Boy 3rd Class. He rose through the ranks and served on numerous vessels, eventually attaining the rank of Captain of the Forecastle. He retired on 19 May 1856 after 27 years and 10 months of service. This was the only medal awarded to him.

Recipient	J.LACEY. A.B. H.M.S. HAZARD
Biographical notes	Joseph Lacey served aboard H.M.S. <i>Hazard</i> , which played a key role in defending the town of Russell (Kororareka), during which six crew members were killed and approximately 15 were wounded.
Comments	Only 35 medals of this date were issued to the <i>Hazard</i> . The full stop after the "S" is in fact an inverted comma. No definitive record has been found linking Joseph Lacey's service record to the <i>Hazard</i> , though he remains the most likely recipient. Provenance: H. Recipient	2964 SERGT. PATR. COLEMAN. 57 TH REGT.
Biographical notes	Born in 1837 in St John's, Limerick, Ireland, Patrick Coleman enlisted in the 57th Regiment on 25 August 1854, originally working as a cooper. He served in Malta, Crimea, the East Indies, and New Zealand for a total of 21 years and 100 days (11 years overseas). He was awarded the Crimea Medal with Sebastopol clasp, Turkish Crimea Medal, and New Zealand Medal. Despite nine disciplinary entries, including three court martials, he received a good conduct badge and a second-class certificate of education. He was discharged at Woolwich on 4 December 1876 and granted a pension.



Biographical notes	John Curley was born in 1837, possibly in Roscommon, Ireland (enlistment records list Tillingham, Kent). He enlisted at Howick on 28 August 1863 as a bushman. Curley served at Nukumarū and Kakamea. In 1871, he and Alfred Crew were shot at while pigeon shooting. He received a Crown land grant at Te Awamutu, married Mary Ann Congdon in 1875, and died in Wellington in 1915.

Biographical notes	<p>James Walden was born in Wellington on 1 October 1843, the son of John Walden and Sarah Ann Deighton. He was active in rowing, yachting, and as a jockey. He served aboard the Victorian sloop <i>Victoria</i> in 1860–61 before joining the Wellington Rifles under Captain George Buck during the Titokowaru campaigns. He was injured at Te Ngutu o Te Manu—during which Captain Buck was killed—and recovered Buck’s sword from the battlefield despite his own wounds.</p> <p>Walden continued serving after hostilities; he was appointed Sub-Lieutenant on 25 June 1877, later promoted to Lieutenant. He commanded the Wellington City Rifles during the Parihaka operations in 1881 and resigned in 1885. He subsequently worked as a private detective and racing club official. In 1885, he was acquitted of attempting to tar and feather Sydney Nimmo Muir at Addington Trotting Grounds, amid allegations involving "the wife of a well-known legislator." By 1896, he was recorded as a tally clerk. Married to Margaret Mary McCoy in 1871, he had five sons and one daughter. He died in Miramar on 30 July 1914, leaving an estate valued at £1,500. He is buried at Karori Cemetery.</p>

Mr Walden has held a commission in the corps since 1877, and was admittedly one of the smartest and most efficient officers in the Wellington force. He saw service in the Victorian sloop of war ‘Victoria’ in 1860 and 1861, when she came to New Zealand with the head-quarters of General Dratt, during the Waitara war.</p> <p>—‘Mr Walden afterwards joined the Wellington Rifles, who volunteered for service in the Taranaki district, under Captain Buck during the Titokowaru disturbance; and he was present at Te Rua rua, and at Te Ngutu-o-te-manu, where Major Von Tempsky, Captains Buck and Palmer, and Lieutenant Hastings and Hunter were killed, and Captain Rowan dangerously wounded. Mr Walden was with Captain Buck when he received his fatal wound, and carried him for some distance. Mr Walden in 1881 accompanied his company to Parihaka.’</p>

Biographical notes	Charles Gottermeyer (legal name Karl) was born in Christchurch in 1878 to immigrants from Saxony, Germany. He enlisted in the E Squadron of the South Island Battalion on 8 April 1902, later transferring to the 9th New Zealand Mounted Rifles on 30 June 1902. After returning to New Zealand, he worked as a market gardener. He married Alice May Gilbert in 1906, and, following her death, Wilhelmina Eva Olislaeger in 1918. He died in 1954.

Biographical notes	Born in Dunedin on 29 June 1893, Charles Edward Mayo enlisted as a Private with the Canterbury Regiment on 4 October 1916. A contractor from Waiau, he served in France beginning 26 April 1917. Hospitalised on 24 September 1917, he returned to duty before being killed in action at the Somme on 14 April 1918 as part of the Entrenching Battalion. He is interred at Meteren Military Cemetery, Nord, France.

Biographical notes	Jack James was born in Wellington in 1890. He was a bootmaker when he enlisted on 9 Aug 1914. He served as a private in Samoa from 15 Aug 1914 to 23 Mar 1915 (service no 1/250). He transferred to the Otago Infantry Battalion and embarked with the 4 th Reinforcements on 17 April 1915. He was killed at Chunk Bair on 8 August 1915. He is in an unmarked grave, Panel No. 15, and his name is on the Chunuk Bair NZ memorial, Turkey.

Biographical notes	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Horace William Yaxley was born in Kaikoura in 1891, the son of Mark and Agnes Yaxley. He enlisted as a Trooper with the Canterbury Mounted Rifles on 17 Aug 1914 and embarked overseas on 16 Oct 1914. He was wounded in action on Walkers Ridge on 14 May 1915 and again in the Dardanelles on 29 Aug 1915 (both times a GSW to his right arm) and had malaria in Dec 1916. He was then transferred to the Transport Squadron with which he served in the Egypt and Palestine region. He was promoted to Cpl on 14 Dec 1917 and Sgt on 17 May 1918. He had influenza on 13 Dec 1918 and then contracted typhus. He was transferred to Cairo and died there of typhus fever on 12 Mar 1919 and is buried at the Hadra cemetery at Alexandria. 2. James Dundas Arthur was born in Cromwell in 1891, the son of Edward Arthur and Ellen Elizabeth Reid. He was a miner when he enlisted with the Otago Infantry Regt on 18 April 1915. He served at Gallipoli in 1915 (where he was wounded on 11 Dec 1915), the Egyptian and Egyptian E.F theatres in 1915-16, and then in Western Europe in 1916. On 27 Sept 1916 he received a gunshot wound to his pelvis at the Somme which left him with serious injuries to his internal organs requiring him to be evacuated to England. He was discharged on 4 Dec 1917 as no longer fit for service on account of wounds received in action and he received a one-third pension because of being unfit for the heavy work involved in his previous occupation. He worked as a contractor in Dunedin between the wars. On 23 Sept 1940 he volunteered with the 4th National Reserve Battrn and he served in NZ until 18 July 1942 when he was discharged. At that time, he was an electrician in Dunedin. He married Alexandrina Beaton Frame in 1926 and he died at Nelson in 1965. 3. George Ernest McDonald Elliot was born at Windemere, Canterbury in 1896, the son of George Ernest Elliott and Margaret Hyslop Elliot. He was a teamster when he enlisted as a Sapper with the 7th Reinforcements of the NZ Engineer Tunnelling Company on 3 May 1917 and served in Western Europe. He was discharged on 29 May 1919. He married Estille Stebbing and he died in Nelson in 1960. 4. Walter Batchelor was born at Stratford on Avon, England in 1895. He enlisted on 26 June 1916, and he served on the Western Europe front where he was wounded twice (29 March 1917 and 11 June 1917) He was admitted to hospital with trench foot on 16 Nov 1917 and after leaving hospital he was assigned to duties in the UK. He was discharged in England on 19 March 1919. He died in Onehunga in 1967.



(Edin.), in his fifty-seventh year, which occurred at his home, St. Clair, early yesterday morning, Dunedin has lost an old and respected citizen.</p> <p>The deceased was born in Victoria, being the third son of the Rev. Frances Ewen Stephenson, and was educated at Horton College, Ross, Tasmania, where he secured the Tasmanian scholarship of £200 per annum, tenable at any British University for four years, and the gold medal as dux of the college. He continued his studies at Edinburgh University, taking his M.B. degree in 1890, and in 1906 he returned to Scotland and took his M.D. degree with honours, and was commended for his thesis "The Open Air Treatment of Phthisis." He spent some time in special work in hospitals in London and Dublin. After this he studied and became convinced of the value of homœopathy, and before coming to New Zealand spent a year in the Melbourne Homœopathic Hospital as resident medical officer.</p> <p>He carried on practice in Dunedin as a homœopathic physician for nearly 30 years, and some time ago established, and carried on successfully for 10 years, the Nordrach Cottage Sanatorium at Flagstaff. Many testimonies could be borne to the success which attended his efforts to relieve and cure disease. He was a man of quiet and undemonstrative but always cheerful bearing, who had a very high sense of duty and many of his patients felt that he became to them a real friend in the truest sense. He was held in the warmest esteem and affection by many in Dunedin. He took his share of war service, going Home as P.M.O. on the Turakina, and did special work at Codford and Walton-on-Thames.</p> <p>Two years ago he was laid aside with a severe illness, but rallied for some time, after visiting Auckland. On Monday last he took a sudden turn for the worse and passed away quietly at his home at St. Clair yesterday.</p> <p>Dr Stephenson always took a keen and active interest in many phases of social life. He was a member of the Otago Institute and of the Otago Club, vice-president of the Otago Cycling Club, and a member of the Kaituna Bowling and Tennis Clubs, and of late years the St. Clair Bowling Club.</p> <p>In 1896 he married the second daughter of the late Mr W. A. Ewing, who survives him. He leaves two sons and two daughters, of whom the elder son (Mr Frank Stephenson, sheep farmer) and daughter (Mrs Harold Shires) reside in the North Island.</p>



